Lesson Instruction and Journal Entry

Todays Outline:

For todays class we will be exploring and analyzing different "artifacts" that embody some of the social, political, and cultural aspects of Canadian life (primarily British Columbians) during the turn of the century.

Activity -- Carousel:

- 1. Ms. Zanon assigns groups
- 2. Meet your group at the station assigned (corresponds with the number Ms. Zanon assigned you)
- 3. Begin investigating the stations "artifacts"
- 4. After 15 mins, move to the next station This process continues until all stations have been completed
